#### **Rainier School District Highly Capable Program**

Highly Capable Nominations for the 2022-2023 school year <u>will open</u> February 1, 2023. Teachers and parents may nominate students to be considered for the Highly Capable Program from **February 1, 2023 to February 28, 2023**.

If you would like to have your child considered for testing, nomination forms will be available in each school office as well as on the district website beginning on February 1st. They must be returned to your child's school office no later than **FEBRUARY 28, 2023.** All nomination forms will be reviewed and all students nominated will go through a screening process that includes a review of state Assessment scores, teacher input, online screening assessment (CogAT) and district assessment scores. Those students who advance through the initial screening process will then take the complete battery of tests (CogAT) online. Parents will be notified if their child will complete the full battery of testing or not.

A selection committee will review all the test results and other pertinent information such as full battery CogAT test, grades, creativity and information from parents and teachers. Those students considered highly qualified will be identified, and the students and parents will be notified.

Those elementary students who are identified as highly capable will be placed in advanced reading and/ or the advanced math group. Middle school students will be placed in the Honors Programs, and the high school students will be placed in AP classes.

February 1st-28th Parent/Teacher HiCap nominations open March 6th-24th Online screening and full battery testing March 21st-April 21st Notification sent to parents with results

Vision screenings are being held on December 6th by the Aberdeen Lions Club and Yelm Lions Club. I am so thankful to have them come and assist with my vision screenings this year.

If your student fails the vision screening; I will rescreen them and if they fail a second time a referral letter will be sent home. If they fail, it is recommended to have them evaluated by a health care provider.

Hearing screenings were completed on November 14th and rescreens will start soon. If your student fails the hearing rescreening, a referral letter will be sent home. It is recommended for them to be evaluated by their provider.

## CHILD FIND NOTICE

- Are you worried about your child's development?
- Does your child have difficulty keeping up with other children their age?

- Does the child seem to have hearing or vision issues?

### WHAT HAPPENS DURING A CHILD FIND SCREENING?

Potential outcomes of a screening include recommendations for the family to implement in the home, a recommendation for a comprehensive evaluation through the school district or a referral to a community agency for support.



### WHERE CAN I GO FOR A SCREENING?

If your child or family is living in a temporary situation, you may still contact the local district for a screening.

WAC 392-172A-02040: School districts shall conduct child find activities calculated to reach all students with a suspected disability for the purpose of locating, evaluating and identifying students who are in need of special education services and related services, regardless of the severity of their disability.

#### Rainier Landscape Students Accomplish a Hugelkultur Bed

Last spring, landscape students decided to build a Hugelkultur bed out in our back field by our small orchard.

Hugelkultur is a centuries-old, traditional way of building a garden bed from rotten logs and plant debris. These mound shapes are created by marking out an area for a raised bed, clearing the land, and then heaping up woody material (that's ideally already partially rotted) topped with compost and soil.

Our goals: to grow perennial flowering plants with little to no water needed that we can use in fresh floral arrangements in the fall, bring pollinators into our orchard, teach current trends in growing all while conserving water and resources.

Students began collecting branches, compost and soil. We spent some time at Mr. Lybecker's home loading up old cottonwood logs that he donated for the bottom of the pile. We collected 2 years of fruit tree pruning branches and 7 years of compost generated from our community garden and greenhouse production. We had another amazing community member donate over 20 yards of fresh ground wood chips to use in the layers as well.

Once we collected our materials, students started laying the logs and adding green and brown layers until the bed was about 8 feet wide and 6 feet tall at the peak. Our initial idea was to let it sit and settle for the summer and start our plantings in the fall and spring of this current school year. Our compost that we added had a different idea and we had numerous types of squash, sunflowers, kale, dusty miller and lavender grow over the summer. We were able to harvest the produce for the Rainier food bank and we have been using the plants in some of our fall arrangements. As we finish harvesting the crops that volunteered to grow this summer, we will be changing over to plants that produce flowers and foliage to use in our floral program. I have included a few pictures of the building process.














## Art Department










### RHS Floral Department
